

## PRIMARY LOGO

The official GSGA logo is composed of the Emory Shield\*\*, Emory Wordmark\*\*, and GSGA Wordmark encircled by the names of all the Graduate and Professional Divisions. The name of each division is listed as the discipline of study (i.e., Business, Public Health, Nursing, etc.), rather than the name of the school (i.e., Goizueta, Rollins, Woodruff, etc.) in case the name of a school changes in the future.

Pursuant to Emory Branding Standards, GSGA logos should not be reproduced in colors other than PMS 280, Black, or White, and no effects, such as drop shadows, outlines, or gradients, should be added.

The GSGA logo should never be distorted, changed, or amended, unless a new Graduate Division is added.





However, after conversations with University leadership in 2017, GSGA was granted special permission to use both the wordmark and shield. Permission was granted because GSGA is a governing body of the university, similar to the Board of Trustees, SGA, and the University Senate. Furthermore, the Emory identify symbols (PMS 280, Shield, and University wordmark) are universally shared and recognized across all Graduate and Professional divisions.
